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## Bell Introduces New Products at **PEST WORLD 2017**

It was another exciting year for Bell Laboratories at Pest World 2017. More than 3,700 PMPs representing 200 companies gathered in Baltimore, Maryland for the tradeshow and educational events.

Bell Laboratories strives to provide a breadth of tools to PMPs, and this year, we were thrilled to introduce two new products to the industry at Pest World. Our 16-foot tower at the Bell Laboratories booth was decked-out in Contrac Soft Bait, Bell's newest rodenticide developed to perform well in every setting. Bell Technical Representatives were on-hand to talk to customers and PMPs about the key features of Contrac Soft Bait and encouraged them to try it at problematic accounts. Another highlight of the booth was our introduction of Rat Ice to the Pest Control Industry. Rat Ice provides PMPs with a new way to kill rats in burrows.

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To celebrate the first tortoises being born on Galapagos's Pinzón Island in 150 years, a giant, bronze tortoise statue was brought in to the Bell Laboratories booth.

Attendees stopped to take pictures with the tortoise and learned of Bell's involvement in Island Conservation projects, specifically with the eradication of invasive rats on the Galapagos Islands of Pinzón and Rábida. Three years after a successful bait drop, the islands are showing signs of recovery, especially with the newly hatched Pinzón Giant Tortoises.

As the World Leader in Rodent Control Technology®, Bell Laboratories strives to provide solutions to the industry to fully equip Pest Management Professionals (PMPs) with the tools they need to succeed with controlling rodent populations. That is why Bell Laboratories undertook the project to register Rat Ice with the EPA.

In order to make Rat Ice available to the industry, Bell Laboratories conducted comprehensive lab and field studies and generated appropriate data while working with the EPA to obtain the Rat Ice registration. This past summer, EPA's Registration Division registered Rat Ice for the control of burrowing rats.

Rat Ice will become an effective solution for PMPs as they work in urban settings

where rats build nests underground. The availability of food debris and garbage left in places like public parks compete with traditional baits that typically attract rodents, making Rat Ice a more effective solution.

Rat Ice is currently available in Chicago and Bell Laboratories is actively working to make Rat Ice available nationwide. ■



### Technician Tips

## 6 KEY PRINCIPLES TO SUCCESSFUL BAITING

### 1 Choose the right bait for the job

Your choice of rodenticide depends upon the environmental conditions and the severity of the infestation.

### 2 Read the rodenticide label before placing bait

The label instructions give useful information on bait placement. "The label is the law."



### 6 Eliminate the rodents' food, water & harborage whenever possible

Knockdown the population first before applying rodent-proofing measures, as disrupting the rodents' environment may send them scurrying.



### 3 Place bait where rodents travel

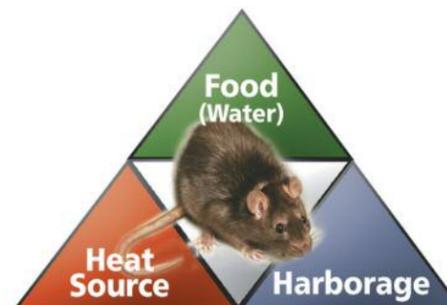
Your inspection will identify the problem areas and the species involved. Place bait where rats and mice will find it.

### 4 Proper number of bait placements

Place enough bait to get rid of rodents. Keep up a fresh supply of bait and remove any spoiled or rancid bait.

### 5 Use bait stations wherever safety is a concern

Tamper-resistant stations help keep bait away from children, pets and non-target species.
